MISSION: To ensure competency and enhance the professionalism

of the Police Officer's serving Cuesta College and the

GOAL: To enhance job skills, professionalism and ethical

standards of all new field officers, in the performance of their duties, through P.O.S.T. approved standardized

training and rating programs.

FIELD OFFICER TRAINING PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

The Field Officer Training Program is a program established and required by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standard and Training (P.O.S.T.). The purpose of the program is to increase police professionalism, throughout the state, by insuring the training and the quality of the performance of all new police field officers.

This program establishes statewide guidelines to evaluate all new police field officers in their performance of a standardized, comprehensive list of most police functions. The tasks to be rated are compiled from police agencies throughout the state with flexibility afforded for each agency to incorporate local and specific policies and procedures.

The success of this program rests with the Field Training Officer (F.T.O.). It is imperative that the F.T.O. not only ensure the training of the new officer, but also realize the responsibility to the community, the agency and fellow officers in ensuring the quality and professionalism of each new police officer.

At the completion of this program, the new officer must be able to perform all the rated tasks in a responsible, safe, proper and effective manner. The officer must be able to perform these tasks on his/her own, individually and be an officer that can be counted on for back-up or help, should this situation arise.

CUESTA COLLEGE FIELD OFFICER TRAINING PROGRAM

Summary of P.O.S.T. Requirements

- 1. The program shall be a minimum of ten (10) weeks, based on P.O.S.T. training guidelines.
- 2. The program emphasis is on a standardized training and evaluation of the new police officer.
- 3. The new police officer must have satisfactorily completed the regular P.O.S.T. Basic Course.
- 4. The program must have a supervisor selected by the agency's head.
- 5. The new police officer shall be under the direct and immediate supervision (physical presence) of a trained and qualified Field Training Officer during the entire training period.
- 6. The new police officer shall have a daily written evaluation, reviewed with the Field Training Supervisor.
- 7. The Field Training Officer should be selected through an agency process and shall have at least one year of field experience and have completed the P.O.S.T. Field Training Officer Course.
- 8. The Field Training Officer shall be evaluated by the new police officer and the Training Supervisor.
- 9. Documentation of the new police officer's training and performance shall be maintained by the agency.
- 10. In order to be recommended for retention, the new officer shall have demonstrated his/her ability to perform all phases of the training program at a satisfactory level (capability to perform all tasks as a "solo officer").
- 11. The Field Training Officer(s) must attest to the new officer's successful completion of the training program and a concurrence, signed by the agency head, shall be retained in agency records.

FIELD TRAINING PROGRAM OVERVIEW-EXPLANATION

The Field Training Program is intended to facilitate a police officer's transition from an academic setting to the actual performance of law enforcement duties in the community and on the campus. The program provides the opportunity for the training and evaluation of newly assigned officers during actual patrol experience.

To maximize the effectiveness of the program, each new officer will be assigned to a selected, trained and experienced Field Training Officer (F.T.O.). The approach will be firm, professional and as fair as possible, with every effort made to create a positive learning environment for this one-on-one training experience.

The training program will be at least ten (10) weeks, consisting of three (3) phases of at least two (2) weeks in duration. When possible, the new officer will be assigned to a different Field Training Officer each period. The new officer will be rated daily and progress reviewed weekly with the Training Supervisor. All training and progress will be documented and should any additional training become necessary, it shall be administered as soon as practical.

All areas of training must be completed during the training period, ideally under normal working conditions. However, since it is doubtful that every situation will arise during normal patrol, some situations will necessarily have to be played out in scenarios, while others may be determined through conversation, questioning and/or written tests.

FIELD TRAINING PROGRAM FIELD TRAINING OFFICER-INSTRUCTIONS

The Field Training Program covers orientation and topics from review of academy training through advanced field tactics and areas specific to Cuesta College. The training is set up in three phases; each phase will be at least two weeks in duration. It is critical that all material contained in each phase be covered during that phase, as many subjects build on previously covered materials. It is therefore incumbent that the F.T.O. establish a time line to ensure that all topics are covered within the prescribed time.

Although categories are designed to be presented in sequence, this pre-supposes control over events, which, of course is not possible. In order to cover each category within the time-line, the F.T.O. will, of necessity, have to present scenarios, administer tests and/or discuss topics in order to complete specific categories of training. Additionally, should events arise that a category or topic is handled, it can and should be evaluated, or reevaluated, even though out of sequence or phase.

It is imperative that the officer being trained satisfactorily completes each category or topic. Therefore, should any problems arise in completing a category, it should be brought to the attention of the Training Supervisor as soon as possible so that any problems or deficiencies can be addressed as soon as possible.

In addition to the daily evaluation, the F.T.O. must complete and review with the officer being trained a competency evaluation for each category of training completed. Comments are extremely important in these evaluations. Describe the officer's actions or performance, what happened, not how. Try to refrain from evaluating personality or make predictions as to future performance. Additional space is provided for comments, training administered or suggestions on the back of each form. Please describe the officer's performance as thoroughly as possible so the Training Supervisor can properly review the officer's progress.
