SESSION 4 KEYNOTE:

Hispanic Serving Institutions In Practice

In this keynote address, Dr. Garcia discusses her book Hispanic Serving Institutions in Practice: Defining "Servingness" at HSIs, published by Information Age Publishing (2020). She will talk about the "structures of serving" and provide examples about how HSIs are transforming their structures in practice and how each of us can think about servingness as a multidimensional concept that can be addressed in unique ways by each college.

Dr. Gina Ann Garcia is an associate professor in the department of Educational Foundations, Organizations, and Policy at the University of Pittsburgh. Her research centers on issues of equity and justice in higher education with an emphasis on understanding how Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) embrace and enact an organizational identity for serving minoritized populations. She also seeks to understand the experiences of administrators, faculty and staff within HSIs and the outcomes and experiences of students attending these institutions. Finally, her research looks at the ways that race and racism have shaped the experiences of minoritized groups in higher education. She is considered a leading scholar on HSIs and works directly with institutions to determine how to best enact the HSI identity and the concept of servingness.



SESSION 5:

Building Equity Through Belonging

The need to belong is considered a fundamental human need. It is the motivation to form and maintain meaningful social relationships. A lack of belonging is a problem for ALL students at Cuesta (See RP Group, 2018). The classroom is one of the few places students can make connections (particularly because it is a commuter campus). However, often students enter the classroom and feel disconnected, especially minoritized/stigmatized students. This can produce a host of negative emotions and impaired cognitive processing. This workshop will focus on classroom-level interventions that can help provide students with a sense of belonging and in doing so improve a host of outcomes for our students including retention, academic performance, and overall health.

Introducing Kaltura - Enhance Your Course with Recording and Editing Tools

After learning this past spring that our current service provider would be discontinued, we took time to seek a replacement. We are excited to introduce you to Kaltura, a web-based video management platform that allows instructors, students, and staff to upload, edit, manage, and share videos and other media. This workshop is dedicated to ensuring that you acquire mastery as quickly as possible without sacrificing quality.

You will find this replacement provides solutions you have been looking for, such as simple, yet powerful analytical data so you can track who is viewing your videos, when, and for how long. Faculty can use the data to modify their teaching strategy, communicate to students in need, and summarize outcomes. Kaltura also can organize your custom content by chaptering longer video into searchable short clips, to facilitate student navigation when engaging with the content. Playlists allow you to merge multiple videos into a single player with a navigation menu. Kaltura integrates with Zoom, and your online session recordings will automatically be stored in your media space for easy access. Kaltura has auto captioning features, including the ability to lay captions over YouTube Videos, and multilingual to ensure equity and access for all.

This will be an introductory training on how to get started with Kaltura, and there will be follow up sessions on more advanced features and transitioning from TechSmith Knowmia (Relay) in the future.

Hunger of Memory by Richard Rodriguez

"Hunger of Memory is the story of Mexican-American Richard Rodriguez, who begins his schooling in Sacramento, California, knowing just 50 words of English, and concludes his university studies in the stately quiet of the reading room of the British Museum. Here is the poignant journey of a 'minority student' who pays the cost of his social assimilation and academic success with a painful alienation — from his past, his parents, his culture — and so describes the high price of 'making it' in middle-class America." Written in 1983, Hunger of Memory is a classic education memoir that presents provocative positions on affirmative action, bilingual education, and the difficult choices that multilingual and first-generation students are asked to make within institutions of higher learning. In doing so, it offers contemporary readers much to discuss, to challenge, and to consider in the light of where we stand almost 40 years later. As educators, what role do we play in maintaining, revising, demolishing, and reimagining the institutional structures that defined Rodriguez's experience and the experiences of our own students?
