


Mid-Term Study Jam

Crystal says:



Communicating Outside of Class




WhatsApp is a fun way to stay connected with your class and teacher, improve your conversational English, and interact with your classmates. Talk to your teacher about setting up a class chat group.




Pronto is integrated into Canvas, and you can use it on a computer or download the app on your phone. You will be able to send text messages to the entire class, individual students, and your teacher. It takes a few steps to set up, but you don't need everyone's phone numbers because all registered students are automatically in the class.















How Do You Stay Connected?



When you contact your teacher, there are important pieces of information that you need to include, such as your name, the class you are taking, and why you are calling. 


